Our Parent Institution 'RAYAT SHIKSHAN SANSTHA', SATARA, founded by Padmbhushan Dr. KarmveerBhauraoPatil, on October 1919. It is devoted to the cause of the education of socially and economically backward classes in the society. The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well-planned and documented process. The college is affiliated to Shivaji University and enlisted under 2(f) & 12b of the UGC provides instructions at UG in both Arts and Commerce and PG & Research in Science stream and also provides teaching facilities with faculty and non-teaching staff members. The institute employed different stages in the process of implementation of the curriculum. The main focus in the form of goals and objectives of the college is to impart quality education to all, especially to the socio-economically deprived students. With this mission, the college offers a wide range of programmes under two disciplines including undergraduate, post-graduate, and self-financing and skill development courses. IQAC of the college prepares Institutional Development Plan regarding curriculum. IQAC of the institution often consulted on academic matters which are as follows: 1) A uniform Academic Calendar prepared consolidated with each departmental academic calendar for curriculum planning. 2) Departmental Meetings will be held in each department to distribute the work-load. 3) Discussions are held on the methodologies of different approaches to the curriculum. 4) All departments prepare a time-table to allocate the curriculum. 5) For the proper implementation of the curriculum, semester-wise teaching plans will be done according to the syllabus, available periods and academic calendar. 6) According to the teaching plan, daily synopsis will be written by the faculties for effective process. 7) At the end of the term 'Syllabus Completion Reports' are invited from the faculties to the IQAC. 8) The institute organizes seminars, workshops on revised curriculum for the benefit of the teachers and students. In this Academic year, Department of Chemistry organized 'Workshop on Revised Syllabus', for B.Sc.-I. Also our faculties participated in the workshops on revised syllabus. 9) Whenever syllabus is revised, the concerned faculties of the subjects are deputed to attend the workshops. The separate budgetary provision is made to encourage teacher to participate in seminars, conferences and workshops. 10) To encourage the faculty, management awards 'the best teacher award' to the faculty for their best performance. 11) 04 teachers are the member of Board of Studies and they actively participate in the designing/ framing curriculum. 12) Faculties attend the syllabus framing meeting and participate in the discussion and contribute in drafting it. 13) Faculties merely send their suggestions to BOS through correspondence. 14) Faculty prepared audio recording, PPTs of the lectures and uploaded on the college website. 15) Faculty personally interacts with the students and gives advice about the curricula. 16) Institute launched special scheme named, 'Students Adoption Scheme'. Through this scheme, a teacher tries to know students learning difficulties and tries to reduce their problems. The college networks and interacts with the stakeholders from industry, research institutes and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum. 17) The college provides library and e-learning facilities (INFLIBNET) to the faculties to effective delivery of

The faculty of our College designs the syllabus of Career Oriented Courses, Add on Courses and Short term Courses which are started in our college. Most of the faculty members are also participated in SIM writing of concern subjects of distance education. The teachers also participate in syllabusrevision' workshops organized by various colleges/ institutes. Teachers have also worked as Resource persons in workshops organized for syllabus restructuring. They give their valuable inputs to restructuring of the curricula. Other faculty members, who are not on university bodies regarding syllabi design they participate in workshops on revised syllabus conducted by university and communicate their suggestions to the concerned BoS of the concerned subject.. During the last five years, majority of the faculty have participated in academic conferences related to curricular aspects. This feedback is passed on to the concerned Board of Studies at the workshops on curriculum revision. The college, however, provides valuable inputs to the process by way of seeking feedback in many ways such as : 1. 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The college has since last several years practised a system of mentoring called the Tutorward system, whereby a tutor was provided to every ward to look after his/her academic and psychological well being and also monitor class attendance and performance. The same system has now been restructured and named Mentor system. Under the Mentor system, all teachers of the college have been engaged as mentors to 25 students each. At the beginning of the academic session, the mentors are allocated the students. The mentors are responsible for academic progress and psychological wellbeing of their mentees. They are also entrusted with the task of monitoring the attendance and academic progress of the students. They also provide primary psychological counselling to those who need them and refer them for more professional counselling, if required. At the beginning of the academic session, the mentors conduct orientation programmes for the mentees, whereby they are acquainted with the institution, its goals and mission, the facilities available. The mentors maintain the details of each individual mentee including educational background and socioeconomic status. They also maintain record of their class attendance, class performance and academic progress. The mentors use both formal and informal means of mentoring.

The college has begun the consideration of taking the class tests under newly introduced CBCS system from the coming years. The college prepares academic calendar at the beginning of the year and it is published in the brochure of the college. The institution examination department declare the tentative scheduled of examination at the start of the college. The schedule includes the total examination pattern and type of examination for the different disciplines in the college. The unit test were organised by the department at their own timetable of their period. The midterm and preliminary examination for the third year students were organised by the respective departments. Democracy, election and good governance were organised by the politics department in Oct. 2018 for the first year students of all disciplines and they were allotted the certificate of qualifying examination The university examination were organised by the examination department as per scheduled declared by the university in October and march every year. The practical examinations were conducted by preparing the timetable of every class of science stream and it is communicated to the university in every year at the March/ April 2018. The grievances related to examination resolved when results were declared and soon communicated to students with the help of mobile phones. Thus the examination and assessment process is transparent and robust with different mechanism employed. B.A./ B/Com./B.Sc./B.S.C. I college exam process and grievances were transparent and time bound.

#### 2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The academic calendar prepared by the calendar committee of the institution before at the beginning of the year and it is displayed in the college admission brochure and website. The calendar consists of CIE and University examination. The institution ensures effective time management and timeliness. Percentage of power requirement of the University met by the renewable energy sources

The college is continuously working towards making the campus pollution free. It also takes measures to create environmental consciousness among the students and the staff as well as among the residents of nearby area of the college. In order to keep the campus green and pollution free, trees are planted on various occasions. As a Maharashtra Government special drive of Planting Thirteen Crore Trees (Tera Koti Vrisha), the college has planted 1000 trees in Shenda Park Area of Kolhapur through our thirty NCC cadets on 14/7/2018. On 15th July 2018, the NCC unit has planted 25 trees on the campus and on the occasion 90th birthday of Dr. N. D. Patil on 16 July 2018, we planted 90 trees. We keep the campus plastic free. Public transport is commonly used by the staff and the students. Most of the students use bicycles. Ours is a unique botanical garden with several medicinal plants. It is also considered as oxygen zone. Every year, our Botany Department conducts Green Audit of the campus. As a water saving measure, Drip And Sprinkling Water Systems are also in use. The waste water of the swimming pool is also recycled and used for the garden and trees on the campus. There is Rain Water harvesting system in the college helps to restore the rain water for laboratory and campus requirement. The rain from the

ladies is stored in rubber lined ferrocrete tank. The capacity of the tank is 5000 litres and the water is used in laboratory and for the batteries .From the project the college has saved 25000/ of distilled water. Annual rain water harvesting potential is 1606608.78 litres For energy conservation, the college has mounted the Solar Energy Unit worth Rs 69964/ on Womens hostel roof of the college with a capacity of 5 KWP. The use of 12 Watt LED bulbs in classrooms and office to save electricity. The monthly energy saving due to this was 420 kwh. Similarly instead of 500 Watt Mercury /Sodium Vapour lamp, we used 50 watt fixture which resulted in monthly energy saving of 972 kwh. Total energy saving was 1392 kwh unit per month. The Waste Management is done through Vermi Composting unit in the college botanical garden having measurement 12x2.5x2.5 feet is also used to reduce the wastage in the college .this unit is used for preparing vermin compost ,organic fertilizer used in farming .As per the instructions given by our Management,e waste is done away with the help of authorized dealers of the Sanstha.The electronic equipments as well as electrical material is done away with Management Resolution No 6 ( 9) dated 23/11/2018.The amount received from Electronic Equipments is Rs 39990/and Computer Accessories worth Rs 9,17,142/ .total amount received Rs 9,57,132/

Great humanitarian and founder of our institution, Late Padmabhushan Dr Karmveer Bhaurao Patil was a Man of Vision. In October 1919, he established Rayat Shikshan Sanstha in a Satyashodhak meeting at Kale near Tal Karad of Satara district as a social and educational mission. He has before his eyes the illiterate and socially backward masses of Indian society in general and of Maharashtra in particular. The sanstha is prominently working for the farming community the downtrodden and weaker section. As a part of mission it runs maximum colleges and schools at taluka level as well as in tribal area. The sanstha has completed its 100 years in 2019 and still the mission of Bhaurao Patil was incomplete. Sanstha has to go forward with the same noble mission of rendering the higher education to rural mass which is socially and economically backward. It is working in secondary and higher secondary as well as college level education. The people called Bhaurao Patil Karmveer. Pune University honoured him with Honorary Doctorate, D. Litt. The Government of India honoured him with Civilian Honour Padmabhushan Award for his contribution to society. R. C. Shahu College Kolhapur was established in the 1962. It has completed its golden jubilee in 2012. The college is located near a slum area that is Vichare Maal locality. It has students from nearby villages. They are either economically weaker or socially backward belonging to SC ST NTC and other categories. The college has a unique scheme called Earn and Learn Scheme

through which students are able to complete their education by getting financial support through working for two hours in canteen library office and college campus. During the academic year 201819, the total number student under this scheme was 22. The financial assistance the enrolled student got was Rs 71108/ .Similarly as a part of the scheme ,16 students received financial assistance of Rs 1000/each from the funds raised by Late Dr K R Patil .From other sources such as College Alumni Association and others, Rs 24871/ was also donated .the total amount goes to 1,11,979/. The college has Thirteen Shiv Chtatrapati Puraskar Awardees in the Sports Category. One of our faculty and International Kabaddi Coach Dr. Ramesh Bhedigiri is Dadoji Kondev Puraskar Winner .The college has a long tradition of wrestling and kabbadi wnners.The college has International Olympic Level Swimming Tank in the name of National Swimmer late Sagar Prashant Patil Swimming Tank .It is one of the best tanks in Shivaji university area.we have trainers and the required staff. The college provides free access to the tank to Divyangjan and young promising swimmers from the slum area near the college. The college has produced many international national and statelevel players. On academic and research front the college is doing well. It has to its credit one patent in Chemistry one by our faculty.
